Weaverling to be Guest of Honor of NJ Lions 2023 State Convention



Congratulations to the Parsippany Lions Club in their quest to serve their community.





he Lions Eye Bank of New Jersey (LEBNJ) was founded in 1970 at the College of Medicine and Dentistry of Newark. It became the Lions Eye Bank of New Jersey in 1988 when it became a Multiple District 16 Project, and in 1993, became a State Approved Project. LEBNJ serves the entire State of New Jersey.

In 2015, LEBNJ became a subsidiary of Midwest Eye-Bank headquartered in Michigan. Midwest eye-banks is a nonprofit corporation that also owns and operates eye-banks and Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, Connecticut and Internationally in Pakistan, and South Korea, under the new corporate name EVERSIGHT. Eversight is accredited by the Eye Bank Association of America (EBAA).

Eversight's mission is to restore sight and prevent blindness through the healing power of donation, transplantation and research. Eye banking services are offered at no charge when patients are unable to afford transplant procedures through our Gift of Sight (Gratis Tissue) program.

Creating authentic relationships is our philosophy. We work with donors and their families, transplant recipients, surgeons, researchers, Lions, and every advocate and partner in our mission.

Service, Drive and Trust are the guiding principles that ensure we succeed in our mission. They drive our actions and the decisions we make. We are attentive and responsive when engaging with our customers, partners and each other. We anticipate others' needs, and strive to exceed their expectations. We are driven to achieve excellence through continuous learning and improving our skills, knowledge and reputation.

We are responsible stewards of the gifts entrusted to us, and honor those who have provided them. We deeply appreciate the good that comes from loss, and we empower our team to make decisions that serve that greater good. Through living our culture every day, lives are forever changed.

Today, our services reach beyond traditional eye banking by advancing treatments of all blinding eye diseases. We operate as a 501(c)(3) public charity with a 15-member board of trustees. A majority of the board members must be Lions from New Jersey.

This performance will help benefit the Chester Lioness Lions charity projects.







ions who wish to pursue leadership roles with their larger Lions community can learn about club operations, opportunities and resources at the Regional Lions Leadership Institute – RLLI. All RLLI activity is lead and coordinated at the local/multiple district level.

The RLLI is designed so that area leaders have the flexibility to customize the curriculum to best meet the needs of their clubs. However, the recommended format is 3 days of interactive training during which participants will learn valuable leadership skills and strategies for overcoming obstacles and creating opportunities, and networking.

Lions who wish to pursue leadership roles within their district/multiple district will benefit from RLLI where they will learn about club operations, opportunities and resources available to clubs, and gain valuable leadership skills and a better understanding on how to serve their communities.

THE MD-16 RLLI consisted of 3 sessions:

- 1. A 2-hour Zoom meeting/opening session on January 19, 2023
- 2. An 8-hour in-person classroom instruction on Saturday January 21, 2023
- 3. An 8-hour classroom instruction on Saturday January 28, 2023

All in person instruction was held at the Sayreville War Memorial High School in Sayreville N.J. State Advisor Dawn Kosobucki and PCC Winster Ceballos coordinated this institute.

Eligible Lions for RLLI:

- Are in good standing and want to better support multiple district or district initiatives
- Have not attended an RLLI within the last five (5) years.

Topics covered at the institute included:

- Lions Fundamentals: Understand the association's history, principles and structure, while exploring the benefits of membership.
- Working In Teams: Review the characteristics of teams and how to develop effective teams.
- Diversity: Recognize the value of diversity and the benefits it can provide for clubs.
- Local Issues & Opportunities: Discuss topic-specific needs or interests of the participants.
- Public Speaking: Develop a framework for preparing speeches and guidelines for effective delivery.
- Time Management: Review the importance of time management, identify obstacles and provide strategies for overcoming those obstacles.
- Personal Mission Statement: Develop a written personal mission statement.
- Member Motivation: Examine personal needs and motivation.
- Goal Setting: Understand the value of establishing goals and develop a plan to achieve goals.
- Speech Preparation: Using the topic outline created in the Public Speaking session, participants finalize their speech to present on Day 3.
- Public Speaking Presentations: Participants deliver their prepared speeches and receive feedback from the faculty.

DOCTORS SPEAK... AND LIONS LISTEN! INSTITUTE OF OPTHALMOLOGY AND VISUAL SCIENCES (IOVS) AT RUTGERS MEDICAL SCHOOL

aturday April 8, 2023 was the annual Doctor's Speak conference sponsored by Lions Eye Research Foundation (LERF). It is at this conference where staff of IOVS explain in lay persons language the latest advances in vision research. LERF Executive Director PID Mel Bray welcomed and thanked those attending in person and virtually.

Dr. Marco A. Zarbin, MD, PHD, FACS, Chair of the Ophthalmology Department/IOVS at Rutgers, our first speaker, thanked the Lions for their financial support to:

- Continue to perform research
- Acquire state of the art equipment
- Provide clinical care

For FY 2022 there were 111 Resident publications creating knowledge with rigorous clinical exposure. By publishing papers our Residents are in a continuous learning environment

For FY 2022 there were 205 faculty publications making our faculty busy both clinically and surgically as opposed to the average ophthalmologist.

Future needs include:

- Additional space for capital improvements
- Additional faculty to occupy that additional space
- Endowments for capital improvements and resident research.

This will include a new outpatient building in 2025.

Our next speaker was Dr. Neel Bhagat, M.D., M.P.H., whose topic was "Diabetic Eye Care and Eye Trauma at IOVS."

There are two types of Macular Degeneration' Wet and Dry.

Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) is an eye disease that can blur your central vision. It happens when aging causes damage to the macula — the part of the eye that controls sharp, straight-ahead vision. The macula is part of the retina, the light-sensitive tissue at the back of the eye.

Dry macular degeneration is a common eye disorder among people over 50. It causes blurred or reduced central vision due to the breaking down of the inner layers of the macular.

Wet macular degeneration symptoms usually appear suddenly and worsen quickly. They may include: Visual distortions, such as straight lines seeming bent, Reduced central vision in one or both eyes.

These changes may be the first indication of macular degeneration, particularly if you are older than age 60.

Dr Bhagat next discussed Diabetes and the Eye.

Diabetes is a systemic disease affecting many organs. The eye is the only organ with blood vessels that are readily visible to a trained provider without having to dissect or cut tissues. When damage occurs to the blood vessels in the eye, this is called diabetic retinopathy, which can cause rapid and permanent vision loss.

Tele-Ophthalmology Pilot Program

This is a developing program where a patient can take a photo from a camera (I-phone/Android) with no dilation and transmitted for as retina specialist to read and obtain a diagnosis. If necessary, the patient is advised to come in for an in-person examination if there appear to be any abnormalities.



Eye Trauma

The IOVS provides Ocular Trauma Service at University Hospital, Newark N.J. This includes:

- Cuts to the eye or globe
- Globe disruption / open globes
- Cerebral bleeds.

The physicians use CAT scans to diagnose and determine the problem(s). With 2100 open globe wounds in New Jersey University Hospital receives the most cases in the state.

This concluded Dr. Bhagat's presentation which included visual examples of eye trauma.

Dr Paul D. Langer presented the topic, "Computerized Planning and 3-D P in Oculoplastic Surgery."

Reconstructive surgery is a complicated procedure whereby the surgeon needs to realign bone structure, account for missing bone structure, create implants where there is defective tissue or removed tumor(s). With 3-D orbital surgery the surgeon can manipulate bone structure virtually via a computer, perform a CT scan, and create a model which is brought onto the operating theatre. This is used to reformulate fractures and/or missing bone structure.

Dr Langer provided various examples of patients experiencing severe trauma which was corrected with customized implants created by 3-D printing. Future uses of this biomedical engineering process include placing 3-D printers in hospitals as the cost of these printers has dropped significantly since first introduced and for computerized planning for surgical processes. As these materials are inert there is no need for anti-rejection drugs.

This concluded Dr. Langer's presentation.

PID Mel Bray thanked everyone for attending either in person and virtually and hopes to see everyone again at the 2024 version of Doctor's Speak.
