
SPECIAL MOMENTS AT WOOD-RIDGE LIONS HOLIDAY PARTY





fter a 2-year hiatus due to the outbreak of the Covid 19 pandemic, walkers and supporters of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation gathered for their annual walk at Liberty State Park on Sunday Nov. 6, 2022. No one was deterred by the change back to Eastern Standard Time as all the participants were ready willing and able to lend their support to this District 16-N and MD-16 State Approved Project.

Normally in early November in past walks there has been weather issues either cold rain or both. However, the JDRF gods were shining brightly on this year's walk as the weather, although overcast was unseasonably warm, which made for a fantastic event.

District 16-N has "adopted" and supported JDRF as a district project under the banner of Team Miracle for Matthew for over ten years when we first learned that Mathew Corsaro grandson of PDG Lou and PZC and current Second Vice District Governor Barbara was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at age 16 months. Because of Lions support and other donations to Team Miracle

for Matthew, as well as other organized teams, there have been technological breakthroughs whereby Matthew (or anyone else with the appropriate app) can now be alerted to fluctions in his blood sugar levels. A wearable insulin pump can administer the appropriate dose of insulin as the need arises. This technology did not exist three years ago!

During the pandemic, the main JDRF Walk at Liberty State Park was canceled in lieu of smaller localized walks with fewer attendees in an effort to mitigate the spread of Covid19. These "mini" walks did not deter the enthusiasm of Lions supporting JDRF and Team Miracle for Matthew. Now that Covid seems to be mitigated to some degree Lions from all over District 16-N participated in this long-awaited main event.

David Corsaro, father of Matthew stated, "after 2years (2020 & 2021), with tiny walks it is great to be back together. Thank you to Lions Clubs who helped raise over \$15,000, which we could not have done without their support." Grandmother Barbara stated, "Lions support at the walk helps towards turning Type 1 into Type none!"

MIDLAND PARK HONORS VETERANS

ith the advent of social media and the ease of internet searches, where students can discover almost anything at their fingertips, keyboards and I-phones, a group of Midland Park Highland School students decided to do things the "old fashioned way."

Students Madeline Eliya, Finley Fells, Dafina Patreski, Melanie Stein and their fellow classmates conceived of a project for their social studies class on how best to honor those veterans from Midland Park who served in the wars and conflicts in the 20th and 21st centuries. Thus, a research project was born.

Under the direction of teachers Mrs. Ganguzza and Mr. Kilgallen, these students used previous Memorial Day programs to research every serviceperson from Midland Park who has served or is continuing to serve in the military. The resulting project is the Highland School Veterans Memorial featuring all service men and women living and deceased or killed inaction under the banner, All Gave Some, Some Gave All.

The students actually performed library research and conducted personal interviews with surviving family members for this project. Included in the project are photos of some those killed in action where available and brief biographies of each service person outlining their branch, rank and service achievements and the date they died in service to our country. Many streets in Midland Park are named in honor of those who have fallen.

The students used the following time periods for their project: World War 1 1914-1918, World War II 1939-1945, Korea 1950-1953, Vietnam 1959-1975, Gulf War 1990-1991, Afghanistan

2000-2021, Iraq 2003-2011. Also listed are active-duty service personnel during the periods of 1939-1970, 1974-2001, 2009-2022.

In fact, Midland Park with a population of 8,000 in 1970 had the highest per-capita of Vietnam War casualties in the nation with eight killed, which prompted then Mayor Cornelius A. Pointer to write to President Richard M. Nixon asking him not to send any more service persons from the borough to Vietnam.

Mr. Peter Galasso, Principal of the Highland School stated, "This 'legacy project' was not just about another project that involved research, collaboration, and creativity to achieve an outcome. It was more than that. This project was about 11 and 12 year old kids taking it upon themselves to honor servicemen and women who walked the same hallways in Midland Park as they do today. Students traveling the Highland Elementary School hallways can now literally see the Service History in Midland Park; past and present. It is comforting to know that Highland school students will know what service to the country looks like because of this project and the work of the students and teachers."

A power point presentation will run in a continuous loop on a television mounted in the center of the Memorial Wall partially funded by the Midland Park Lions Club. With over 300 slides, this encompasses all the veterans that ever passed through Midland Park schools that our students identified. If there is someone that we missed we can always add them to the presentation.

What a great way to honor our Veterans living and deceased and to teach students the power and necessity of proper research techniques, skills which will last them a lifetime.

LIONS LOVE TO USE ACRONYMS

any companies and organizations adopt their own unique jargon and abbreviations - that while understood by insiders are sometimes hard to decipher by those outside their group. Lions are no different in that respect - we have so many acronyms, that it can be a challenge for new members to get up to speed on what they all mean. And when new programs or initiatives are rolled out by Lions International, even seasoned Lions can find it hard to keep up.

If you want to brush up on your Lions Acronyms, **click here** to download a list of with the full term spelled out. Want to help educate your club members about their meanings? Maybe your club's Tail Twister would like to make up a short quiz at a meeting to see how many acronyms each member can get correct.

Lions are busy, and using acronyms can save time - both when speaking and writing. It is easier to say three syllables than nine - "P" "I" "D" instead of Past International Director for example. Just keep your audience in mind when using an acronym. If you are addressing a group that includes many non-Lions, make sure you use the full term at the beginning of your presentation, before reverting to using an acronym. In writing a press release, or even making a fundraising flyer, it is good practice to spell out the full term/title, followed by the short term. You can then use the short form throughout the rest of your document without leaving the reader wondering what those letters mean.




