International President Hill is president of a consulting firm. With 30 years of experience as an educator and psychologist, she has mentored graduate students and psychologists in training. She has also championed the rights of children and youth who are deaf and/or blind.

A member of the Edmonton Host Lions Club since 1990, International President Hill has held many offices within the association, including district chairperson for Membership, Environment, Convention and International Cooperation and Understanding. ions the world came together in Boston MA for the 105th Lions International Convention on July 7-11, 2023. The New Jersey MD-16 Delegation was no exception.

An International Convention always features great events and entertainment, and Boston did not disappoint. From our always fascinating and interesting International Parade of Nations to the rocking of "Killer Queen" a Queen tribute group to our informative plenary sessions, this convention had it all and then some. All Plenary Sessions were hosted by Emcee Extraordinaire Lion Cyril Lim.

The first plenary session featured an address by then International President Brian Sheehan, the always moving flag ceremony and the winners of our Peace Poster and Essay contests, Emma Andrea and Keaton Hamilton respectively.

Congratulations to the Lions of District 16-J and District Governor Evelio Salermo for a fruitful Lionistic year.








































IT'S REORG MEETING SEASON: DISTRICT 16-N

istrict Governor John Carroll 16-N held his reorganization on the beautiful grounds of Camp Marcella on Saturday August 19, 2023. Attending was DG John's partner-inservice Lion Andrea, First VDG Barbara Corsaro and PDG Lou Corsaro, Second VDG SuzAnne Pacala and PCC Mike Pacala, Cabinet Treasurer John Pinkus Sr., PCC Winster Ceballos, PDG Fernando Navarro, PDGs Marie and Jose Nieto, Council Chair MD-16 Ruth Molenaar and State Advisor, PCC Jack Romano. Many Lions from District 16-N also attended the meeting, many of whom were first timers.




















MD-16 WELCOMES INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT DR. PATTI HILL




